1. Title of the UG Internship Programme: *Bātik*/Wax Resist Dye

2. Nature of Internship Programme: Skill Based Internship

3. Description of the Internship Programme: *Bātik* is a dyeing technique using wax resist. The phrase is also used to refer to fabrics having patterns made using such method. Wax is stamped or drawn onto fabric to create *bātik*, which stops color absorbing while dyeing. Upon removing the wax from the dyed cloth, this produces a patterned negative. Multiple cycles of wax application and dying can be used by artisans to produce complex colored patterns. Even within nations, there are stark differences in patterns and motifs. While some patterns are used solely on special occasions and have symbolic meaning, others were developed in response to fashion trends and business demands. Many cultures around the world, including Egypt, southern China, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Nigeria, and Sri Lanka, have documented the use of wax for resist dyeing from ancient times. Although its exact age is unknown, the method that was created in Indonesia—particularly in Java—is among the most advanced. When it was first mentioned outside of Southeast Asia in the 1817 History of Java, it attracted a lot of attention from collectors and academics who studied the customs and crafts. The 19th and early 20th centuries saw a number of advancements in Javanese *bātik*, including the use of stamp printing on wax to boost output. Today, there are a lot of workshops and craftspeople working, producing a variety of goods and inspiring other textile artists and traditions.

- 1. Title of the UG Internship Programme:** *Kalamkārī*
- 2. Nature of Internship Programme:** Skill Based Internship
- 3. Description of the Internship Programme:** One of the oldest art forms in India is the Kalamkari tradition. The Persian language is where the word "Kalamkari" first appeared. Pens are represented by the term "Kalam," and craftsmanship is represented by the word "Kari." Kalamkari art was initially a type of Pattachitra tradition. Later, during the Golconda sultanate (a period of medieval Islamic governance), this painting tradition gained popularity as Kalamkari art. Andhra Pradesh is currently the home of this artistic legacy. There are two different styles of making Kalamkari art in Andhra Pradesh, such as (1) Srikalahasti Kalamkari style and (2) Machilipatnam Kalamkari or Pedana Kalamkari style. All of the steps involved in creating Kalamkari are done by hand in Srikalahasti, while in Machilipatnam, wooden blocks are utilized to represent the various themes. The process of making a kalamkari artwork involves 23 to 25 steps, which include hand painting, tracing, washing in a river or water tank, ironing, dying (natural dye), and natural bleaching (using cow dung). In Kalamkari, cotton and silk fabrics are utilized and natural dyes derived from various fruits, flowers, stems, and seeds are employed to create the hues. The main sources of inspiration for Kalamkari painting are the various characters from the Ramayana and Mahabharata. In this tradition, several religious stories are also told on the textiles. In this tradition,

floral designs, animals, and birds are frequently included subjects. In the past, this tradition used only natural hues. However, in keeping with this heritage, other chemical colors are now employed to meet the demands of a wide range of clients. Furthermore, the cost of natural hues is slightly higher than that of synthetic ones.

2. Nature of Internship Programme: Skill Based Internship

3. Description of the Internship Programme:

Weaving is an age-old practice of human civilization and probably it has started its journey from the very beginning of the human civilization. As one of the chief branches of craft, weaving has a glorious past, just like others. Almost every nation has contributed to spinning and weaving and has built a magnificent history. It is an undeniable fact that the contribution of each race has put its unique mark on the advancement of the spinning wheel, spindle and loom and the rapid progress of the weaving industry. Loom, spinning wheel, cloth and warp beams etc. are the significant parts of weaving a piece of fabric. The loom is evolved to enable us to make a fabric. Thus, in this long journey the gradual development of loom is observed, and we witnessed the evolution of loom from the Primitive loom to the Modern Computerized loom, till date, though the working principal remains unchanged. So far, the ornamentation and decoration of the fabric structure is concerned, it depends on the heald/shaft capacity of the loom used. As we know that every machine has its own limit and efficiency and it happens to the loom, also. Therefore, we see the handlooms is generally confined with 12 shafts and therefore, the limit of ornamentation in structure is limited within it. And to enhance this limitation, we see the Jala and Naka system is added in handloom., which is fully based on human skill and experience. In the era of industrial revolution in Europe Jacquard machine was developed to do the same work of Jala and Naka. And this practice is still in practice both in handloom and Power loom sectors. This course offers to have in-depth knowledge how to make a paper design, the enlargement of the design in graph paper, stepping, insertion of the suitable weave, card cutting, lacing, placement of the card on the loom and then weaving. All the above are the basic things which is same for any Jacquard fitted loom to create decorated fabric through structure.
