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12. Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year(maximum five bullets)

As a measure towards academic quality control of the University, the IQAC played the key role in the process of CAS promotion and direct recruitment of academic staff by formulating PBAS form, screening and scrutiny of applications and assisting in other formalities in a transparent way.

The IQAC is the sole nodal authority in conducting the students' feedback through the Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS) in the prescribed format throughout the entire university with the final year students at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

The IQAC encouraged and assisted faculty members to participate in different Faculty Development Programmes by forwarding and processing their applications as a measure for increasing faculty strength.

The IQAC worked in tandem with all stakeholders of the university - employees, students and alumni - on key performance issues and parameters, which was reflected in the university's NIRF ranking of #37. The IQAC also played a lead role in gathering, collecting and collating data leading to eventual submission to the AISHE portal. In addition, the IQAC helped in undertaking Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) for improvement of academic and administrative perception of the university.

The IQAC was instrumental in processing and forwarding the proposals from faculty members for inclusion of selective quality journals in UGCCARE list. Also, the IQAC with the help of University Central Library assisted faculty members, students and authority in using appropriate tools (e.g. URKUND) to check plagiarism in publications.

The university admission website and online admission system is fundamental to the automation of the university's functionality. All admissions related exercises, including communication within and without the university, applications invited from students, listing of final admission rankings, the actual process of admission including payment of fees and data/document verification, issuance of letters of acceptance and admissions are all done online through the VisvaBharati website and the vbu.ucanapply.com portal. 2. Since November 2019 we are moving towards an entirely online process of internal on and offsite office administration. Talks are in progress and we wish to collaborate with and be an integral part of the SAMARTH initiative of Government of India. 3. All monetary transactions between students and the university are routed through online bank portal including hostel, tuition and other fees. 4. The university hostel website and portal caters to the specialised needs and requirements of the hostelboarders including allotment</p>				

of rooms and beds, payment of fees, lodging of complaints, suggestion and other related communication from the studentboarders' end, download of forms and other service related matters. 5. The entire university area, including the twin campuses of Santiniketan and Sriniketan, are under broadband connectivity provided by MHRD WiFi, Railnet, Jio Private Net @ VisvaBharati and is available throughout the day. 6. All examination related applications including payment of online examination and other examinationsrelated fees and surcharges, issuance of admit cards and roll lists and examination marksheets and examinations results are all done and controlled through online systems managed internally using the utmost secrecy, confidentiality and professionalism. Over and beyond the abovementioned points, the University Computer Centre and the Central Library cater to the needs of students' access to computers and the internet. Students are required to feed in their data on the hostel website which are updated in an attempt to build up a holistic database for the entire university. The University Central Library has a host of MISs at work which help cater to the academic requirements of teacher and students alike as well as deal with plagiarism primarily at the MPhil and PhD levels. Journals and ebooks are available for reading and the University Central Library has access to various online journal databases which teachers and research scholars and associates may access remotely. The finance and accounts departments use appropriate software and proprietorial additions and fixtures to handle, account and disburse salaries and other payments and receipts as well as keep track of the financial activities of the university. The above mentioned MIS operational within the university are the inner gridwork of the various systems that prop up an institution of this stature, growth and spread. The university is slowly moving towards the merging of the various systems at work within the university towards a single system that would be holistic and bring the financial, academic, administrative wings together. Admission of Students	The admissions process at Visva-Bharati is based on online applications,

machine generated merit lists (for an overwhelming majority of undergraduate courses of study), offline counselling, online payments and hostel applications and allotments. Admission tests for all postgraduate MPhil and PhD programmes (as well as a few undergraduate courses) and for all overseas students are conducted by departments including viva-voce (mandatory for MPhil and PhD courses) for all other courses of study. All reservations policies of the Government of India are rigorously adhered to during admissions. Language and other courses offering certificate, diploma and advanced diploma including casual course for foreign students are usually conducted after the annual intake so that freshmen/women may be admitted.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The Dean of Students' Welfare office as well as various departments and schools on their own regularly organise campus placement meetings and fairs where various corporate, media and business organisations come down to offer our students placements in their organisations such as Amazon, Vivo, Oppo, Oracle, Wipro and the like. MOUs with several universities and educational institutions are in place which regularly offer our students placement opportunities in career and academic arenas officials from various government and corporate organisations and academic institutions often come to interact with the students and faculty at formal meets and seminars.

Human Resource Management

Visva-Bharati regularly advises and actively supports teachers and officers to participate in various training and development programmes like orientation, short-term, refresher courses and the like. Leave and pay-packages are at par with the best in India leave and other perks on the lines government rules are adhered to strictly and regularly granted. Timely promotions and career progression interviews are conducted in tune with the latest government regulations and guidelines.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

Visva-Bharati's various libraries are well stocked with academic journals and books as well as e-resources, particularly the flagship Central Library. INFLIBNET has been in place

for quite some time and students and employees alike have recourse to accessing a wide range of journals as well as use the computer terminal for online work at the Computer Centre adjacent to the Central Library. There are limited smart classrooms, numerous classrooms with LCD projection and sound system internet connectivity including wireless fidelity services are available widely throughout the twin campuses in offices, departments, classrooms, libraries, museums, hostels and hospital. CCTVs are scattered throughout the campus adding to increased and effective monitoring of security. Constructions of buildings classrooms and walls have been instituted.

Examination and Evaluation

Visva-Bharati follows the continuous internal assessment process where students are examined internally and often with the help of multiple perspectives including multiple teachers and panels of examiners in addition to using various modes of examination including, but not limited to, written, viva-voce, presentations, quizzes, group work and the like. The continuous internal assessment carries 20 weightage while the end of term final examination is of 80. Questions and patterns are broken to stop predictability and to align with the learning outcomes and course objectives. The entire process of examination from the moderation of question papers to the publication of results is wrapped in confidentiality and secrecy and results are published well within the timeframe re-evaluation options are in place.

Teaching and Learning

Visva-Bharati utilises different models of pedagogical practices ranging from classroom lectures to class-presentation, workshops, group discussions, field trips/study-tours, outreach and extension programmes, internships, collaborations, audio-visual presentations, projects, seminars and the like. All pedagogical practices follow the learning outcomes and course objectives and tires to incorporate technological and mechanical tools and processes into the teaching-learning mechanisms.

Curriculum Development

Under the CBCS syllabi, regular

revisions and updating of curricula are undertaken by all academic departments and centres. Multidisciplinary courses are on offer that merges two (or more) disciplines in a collaborative attempt. Courses are designed keeping in mind traditional practices as well as contemporary demands and market viability. Curricula are also developed in such a way that independent thinking and rational discourse are encouraged among students leading to their becoming self-reliant in academic thought processes. Multiple tool-and-technology based programmes and courses, especially in the post-CBCS syllabi implementation, have been successful with the students and teachers alike. Course contents are also aligned with the minimum course curriculum as stipulated by the UGC and is an integral point in the CBCS framework. Care is taken to include modules and sections that are in sync with the competitive academic examinations like GATE, NET and SAT. All curricula are monitored through Boards of Studies, Research Boards and Institute Boards in the various departments and schools of the university for quality control and compliance with guidelines.

Best Practice 1: Contemporary mural art- a dialogue of public and private engagement and contemporary painting- an eclectic transcultural research-based studio practice : adopted in painting. Improvisation with photographic tools and images are being incorporated in the painterly process to generate an interdisciplinary approach to image making. Moreover, process-based improvisation with pigments and another painterly medium is also exercised. Mural is expanding its horizon from not only engaging with the traditional mediums but also engage with the new techniques like material collage and recycling of used materials like plastic and digital waste. Both painting and mural is responding more directly with the notions of memory through the dialogue with archive. An interdisciplinary research-based approach is introduced in the process and the content of the image. Students conduct projects in public space and engage with the context of the local environment and develop site based mural projects in harmony with the environment. Contemporary painting makes the students aware of its local context, reality of life, culture and tradition and pursues them to explore an independent mind to develop a personal point of view of representation that reflects the concerns of the everyday lifestyle and reality. It promotes a research based critical approach to image making as active cultural engagement. Best Practice 2: Continuous Village Survey Study in India: The study will cover all the major states in the country. Each AERCs/AERUs in the country will take up one state and from that particular state, one village during 2019-20. Within a timeframe of 3-4 years, each AERCs/AERUs need to study 3-4 villages covering major agro-ecological zones in the state concerned. There should be a proper mix of advanced, developing and backward villages in the study coverage and should include villages of different regions, not just limited regions. The focus would be on agricultural change and changing pattern of rural livelihoods and its implication for future development. The study will also evaluate the efficacy of government interventions in rural areas and key drivers of changes in village economy. Since every village is unique, in various ways, no uniform frame-work is possible for all the villages. There are some specific issues and some generic issues that we can cover under this study. The generic issues/dimensions to be covered are social, economic, agrarian, farming, ecological and policies/governance. More specifically it will cover Demographic profile social change Land and agricultural profile across seasons agrarian change Rural livelihood pattern changes therein Ecological or sustainability issues like vulnerability, shocks, coping adaptation and Perception studies

regarding government schemes policies in terms of their impact reach.

Visva-Bharati steers its stakeholders towards introspection and self-learning. It envisions a world where each and every individual have their rightful place and are given due recognition in all sectors of human endeavour. Visva-Bharati hence strives to continually attempt to turn this vision into reality, building on its historic legacy of being an institution of National Importance embarked upon the ideas of Rabindranath Tagore. The makes dedicated efforts to prepare the students under its care to:

- lead professionally successful lives enriched by the love of learning
- build personally fulfilling lives radiating integrity and strength of character
- sustain purposeful engagement with the world with a balanced perspective
- meet with confidence the challenges they encounter in their lives
- flourish in different cultural milieus in an increasingly interconnected world
- uphold the core values of respect for diversity, inclusiveness and humanism
- emerge as leaders charged with new ideas and the capacity to make a difference.

Distinctive Qualities of the University Belief in Scientific Methods for Agriculture - Scientific methods of farming was introduced. Improved seeds were imported. Mechanization of farming and Crop rotation was initiated. Development of Handicrafts- Vocational training to village apprentices and providing crafts training to the students of the academic departments of Santiniketan and Sriniketan. New designs in leather goods were created and various crafts such as lacquer and batik work, book binding and fabric painting were introduced. Part-time employments for rural women were generated. Village Welfare- This includes [a] Sanitation and health [b] Economic improvement, promotion of education and [c] Social and moral progress. The Health Societies were organized by the local communities and lectures were provided on food, village sanitation and preventable diseases. Initiatives were taken through village societies for settling disputes by arbitration, and to bring about mutual trust which has practically died out in the villages, but which was at one time the backbone of village life.

Education- Educational initiatives were implemented at all levels. The curriculum was of the holistic type and included basic literacy, gardening, cooking, math, crafts, recreational activities etc. The major strength of the institute lies in open education system which would be environment friendly, devoid of all sorts of stringent rules and regulations. Simplicity, joyful and creative self-expression in terms of music, painting and dramatic performance etc were the ideals for imparting knowledge to the students. Sustainable Development through Co-operatives- Development of village welfare was also initiated by building cooperatives. The Visva-Bharati Central Co-operative Bank was started in 1927 with the aim of combating rural indebtedness. Economic research and rural surveys were also carried out by the welfare section. Tagore's concept of sustainable development of India is rooted deep in rural regeneration, since the majority of the population of India resides in villages. It has two major aspects-[a] Cooperatives and [b] Panchayats. The University intends to revive of the spirit of the rural masses so that they could be self-sufficient and free from dependence on outside assistance for their economic and social well being.

8.Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

1. Visva-Bharati is mandated to continue implementation, improvement and up-gradation of the minimum common course curricula under the CBCS system that was introduced in the previous academic year. All academic departments and schools will be asked to revise, upgrade and validate the syllabi and course content and emphasis will be given on departments and schools to apply and qualify for special assistance programmes like UGC-DRS-SAP and DST-FIST like in previous years. 2. Academic and administrative energy/initiatives will be focussed on collaborations, outreach and extension activities that will include MoUs and mutually beneficial arrangements between institutes of higher learning and research at national and international level which will facilitate cultural, academic and knowledge/pedagogical exchanges through students and teachers. 3. Existing infrastructure will continue to receive attention through renovation and repairs in addition to new structures being planned and executed. As Visva-Bharati has a large number of extremely valuable heritage structures that are in constant need of preservation and continuity as they are national treasures, the university is going to do everything to preserve the same for posterity with the help of professional and government-approved agencies with a long history of preserving such monuments and structures. 4. Libraries and academic/pedagogical resources (continuing concerted focus on e-resources) along with seamless internet and Wi-Fi connectivity across the twin campuses accessible in classrooms, academic and administrative offices, libraries and hostels would be aggressively pursued and implemented. 5. Examinations and admissions processes - including evaluation and re-evaluation - require attention and incorporation of digitisation and online applications into the functioning without compromising on confidentiality and accuracy. 6. Emphasis will be given on publications by faculty members and scholars in properly approved academic journals in line with the UGC directives as well as encourage them to participate in various seminars and conferences. 7. Various awareness campaigns and camps for students and teachers regarding environment, anti-ragging, sexual harassment and the like will be arranged. As Visva-Bharati draws a large number of tourists and visitors, campaigns and programmes to educate them towards minimising plastic waste and littering will continue as before: a collective effort towards a greener and 'swachh' India. Infrastructural changes and modifications for divyanganganjan students, teachers, employees and visitors will continue unabated like before. 8. Timely career progressions and recruitment of teachers, officers and employees will be initiated following the guidelines of MHRD-UGC research fellows and project fellows also need to be inducted through the year round. 9. Campus placement and recruitment drives for students and scholars need to be improved and increased channels of communication with industry and corporate houses require steady effort and emphasis.
